


Tanzanian National Voucher Scheme Pregnant Woman +Infant Voucher

- Discount voucher for pregnant women (PW) introduced in October 2004; nationwide coverage from May 2006
- 2.79 million nets have now been purchased by pregnant women through the TNVS to end March 2008
- Expansion of TNVS to Infants in 15 regions in 2006/7. Delivery at 9 months with measles vaccination
- >501,677 Infant Voucher redemptions by end March

Development of Private Sector Distribution System



Summary of ITN Coverage (%) for Different Groups



Coverage

- ITN coverage in 2007 only 23% (Any Net: 39%)
- Why is coverage so low after provision of >2 million nets?
- Late attendance for ANC,
- Not all women receive a voucher at first visit,
- Low net re-treatment rates (45% in 2006)
- PW voucher redemption rates have declined from 87% at start of programme to 78% today

Under Five Catch up and retreatment Campaign

The Way Forward Key Activities in 2008

• Keep Up

Upgrade of Pregnant Women and Infant
Voucher to permit purchase of <u>LLIN</u>

- Reduction of top-up amount to Tzs 500/= (\$0.40)

The Way Forward Key Activities in 2008

Under 5 Catch Up

• Free distribution of 7.1 million LLINs to children age 0-5

Re-treatment of existing net crop

- Current polyester net crop estimated (2007) at ~10 million nets
- Only 45% treated within last 12 months
- Re-treatment campaign for 6.5 million nets with longer lasting treatment (insecticide + binder) in conjunction with Under Five Catch-Up campaign

Free Universal Coverage

Achieving Universal Coverage

 To achieve universal LLIN coverage in 2010 would require about 13 million LLINs

• As a result of the U5 and Net Re-treatment registration process we will have an accurate inventory of both sleeping spaces, nets and their distribution

Proposed idea for Global Fund Round 8 Proposal

- Free universal coverage campaign using the same mechanism as the under five catch up campaign (ie not through the existing system).
- Brings up issues around sustained access in the future
- Short notice not been fully discussed and agreed in existing working groups

WHO Position Paper 2007

Global Malaria Programme calls on national malaria control programmes and their partners involved in insecticide-treated net interventions to:

- purchase only long-lasting insecticidal nets;
- distribute free or highly subsidized Long Lasting Impregnated Nets (LLINs), either directly or through voucher/coupon schemes;
- achieve full LLIN coverage, including in high-transmission areas, by distributing LLINs through existing public health services;
- develop and implement locally appropriate communication and advocacy strategies to promote effective use of LLINs; and
- implement strategies to sustain high levels of LLIN coverage in parallel with strategies for achieving rapid scale-up.
- The just signed AFRO/PMI MOU, May 2008, which mentions the preference for LLINs and states that both parties "support a multi-faceted approach for distribution, using both the public and private sector."

Way Forward???

- Agree that DPs support universal access to LLINs as one element to achieve MDGs
- Agree that the issue is more around <u>how</u> to achieve this than <u>whether</u> we should seek to achieve this.
- Propose that we use the <u>existing system</u> to achieve free universal coverage (eg a fully subsidised voucher).....or another system????
- Leave the timing of when to submit this to the government
